Lighting the Way by Their Example

This is a love story that goes from San Francisco to Odessa, to Israel, with many stops along the way. But it begins in Detroit, where Stephen and Nancy grew up without ever meeting, despite several near misses. Stephen was a childhood customer in Nancy's father's electronics store, and later they both went to the University of Michigan. And yet, they remained strangers well into their adulthood.

They finally met at a Young Adult Federation event in Detroit, where their partnership and philanthropy bloomed.

Stephen had graduated from Michigan's School of Engineering and gone on to be president and owner of Deco-Grand, a manufacturer of precision components and assemblies for diesel engines and the automotive industry, before cofounding Grand/Sakwa Properties, one of the largest developers of residential and retail properties in the Midwest.

While in Detroit, Nancy served as chair of the Federation's Annual Campaign. She thus hit the ground running after she and Stephen moved to San Francisco, serving as a Federation Board member, Campaign Co-Chair, and President of the Board of Trustees.

Together, Stephen and Nancy's philanthropy encompasses the local and global Jewish communities, as well as cancer

research, alternative and renewable energy sources, the arts, job training for the homeless, and science and medicine—often stepping up to make the groundbreaking gift that allows a new, big idea to become a reality. A few examples include:

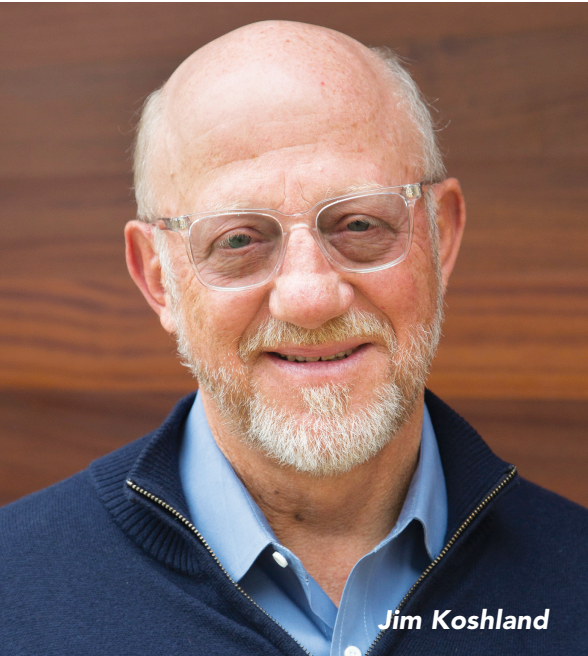

- The Weizmann Institute of Science National Center of Personalized Medicine, which is creating one medical breakthrough after another.
- The Technion-Israel Institute of Technology, which researches alternative energy sources and where Nobel Prize-winning research happened to create a medication that saved Stephen's life.
- Family House, that provides temporary lodging to low-income families of pediatric cancer patients.
- And JDC's Beit Grand Jewish Cultural Center, the first JCC in Odessa, Ukraine, which has been credited for the renewal of Jewish life in the city and across the former Soviet Union.

The Grands are not afraid to step forward, providing seed funding for projects that have enormous potential for helping the vulnerable. And that generosity will continue with their Centennial Campaign commitment.

A Treasure for Generations to Come

The Book of Life is a stunning work of art that houses a unique treasury of testimonials from local donors, recording their ideals and motivations for keeping our Jewish community strong and healthy. Designed by renowned Bay Area artist Joseph Goldyne, the book is prominently displayed in the Federation’s building at 121 Steuart Street in San Francisco. All Centennial donors are invited to compose messages that will permanently document the personal thoughts, stories, and values that deepened their Jewish identity and inspired their philanthropy. Along with being included in the Book of Life, donors who have made commitments of \$250,000 or more will have their names inscribed on Jerusalem stone in the artistically crafted Wall of Honor, located in the Federation’s lobby.

"Since I've retired, I've become a serial board chair for Jewish organizations," Jim joked.

He is currently applying his leadership skills as the Chair of the Federation Board. Jim has also served the Jewish

community as president of Congregation Beth Am, board president of Stanford Hillel, board chair of Camp Newman, senior vice chair of the World Union for Progressive Jewry, vice chair of the Foundation for Jewish Camp, and board chair of Moishe House. As impressive as his commitment to the community has been, it is matched by the efforts of his wife, Daryl Messinger, who has served as past president of Congregation Beth Am, past chair of Oshman Family JCC and the North American Board of Trustees, as well as the first female president of the Union for Reform Judaism.

Jim and Daryl share a deep commitment to the Jewish future as evidenced not only by their significant service, but by their Centennial legacy gift. "The challenge for every organization in the Jewish world is how to attract the next generation," said Jim. "Well, I know a lot of people in the young Jewish community. Whether it's At the Well or a Moishe House or a Hillel program, I know Federation is working across the spectrum to find pathways for meaningful engagement. What's the most fun for us is seeing those young people recognizing the importance of what we do."

A Strong Desire to Give Back

Harold, 94 and Eleonore, 93, grew up with their mother in a small town in the German Black Forest where they owned a farm that had been in their family for generations. In the early 1930s everything changed with the persecution of the Jews.

Harold's mother managed to get her 12-year-old son on a children's transport to the United States where children were placed in foster homes, hostels, schools, and farms, many forced into manual labor. Meanwhile, his mother and sister were taken to a concentration camp, where Eleonore spent two years before escaping to a convent basement in France. Sadly, their mother did not survive.

Eventually, a local Jewish agency placed Harold in the Bay Area, where he found a job as a sheet metal worker. He worked relentlessly, saving money to be able to support his sister and mother, in case they survived the war. In 1945, Harold and Eleonore found each other again through a Red Cross 25-word postcard. "That was a miracle," he says.

In 1946, Eleonore arrived in New York by boat and Harold bought her a plane ticket for San Francisco. He was 21 and she was 20, and they were reunited for the first time in nearly 10 years.

By 1950, Harold bought a run-down cabin for weekend getaways in the Santa Cruz Mountains and it became the center of their lives. As aging made traveling more difficult, Harold and Eleonore decided to put the cabin up for sale.

Together, they gifted the cabin sale proceeds to the Federation and established two Charitable Gift Annuities, one in each of their names, ensuring them both a supplemental income for life with the remainder going to support the Jewish community. Charitable Gift Annuity

Income for Life While Funding your Centennial Legacy

A Charitable Gift Annuity (CGA) is a way to plan for the Jewish future and to receive a fixed income for life. It’s a simple agreement in which the Federation agrees to pay one or two annuitants fixed lifetime payments, in exchange for a gift of cash or appreciated stock. A CGA can be created in person or by mail and here are answers to common questions we receive about this simple way to give:

When do payments begin?

Quarterly payments may begin immediately or be deferred at least one year into the future.

Does my gift qualify for an income tax deduction?

CGA donors may qualify for an income tax charitable deduction equal to the amount the gift exceeds the fair market value of the annuity, subject to IRS rules.

When can the Federation use my gift?

Upon the final annuitant’s death, the CGA remainder matures and can be used for the Jewish community.

Invest in the Jewish Future

If not now, when? Make your imprint tailored to your interest and needs. One way to ensure that your annual gifts live on in perpetuity is with a Perpetual Annual Campaign Endowment (PACE) or a Lion of Judah Endowment (LOJE). You can also establish or add to a special purpose fund in an area of importance to you. Perhaps you would like to make a gift to the Federation’s endowment or create another fund that will meet the future needs of our community.

Choose your gift vehicle.

The simplest and most common way to make a legacy gift is through a bequest, which is a gift from your will or trust. Another vehicle—with great tax advantages—is your retirement plan (401(k) or IRA). To benefit from additional income during your lifetime, consider a charitable gift annuity or a charitable remainder trust.
